# Fran Lee -Acocks Green Village in Bloom

#### Mrs Meakin - 1st

The judges considered that Mrs. Meakin's garden had the edge over the others. We were met by tall hollyhocks and lots of white shasta daisies lighting up the borders. Shrubs softened the fence and the borders were very neatly edged. The 'soft furnishings' of the garden including arches and a small lighthouse added to the cosy ambiance. Day lilies were in abundance and there were the makings of the true cottage garden when rhubarb was mentioned and the possibility of growing other vegetables. We could immediately tell that she loves her garden.



#### Liz Leach - 2nd

The judges were greeted with a colourful front garden – Verbena bonariensis stood tall, with the annual lobelia, blue and white (do you think she is a Birmingham City fan?). These bright colours contrasted with the dark leaved cannas. She can be described as a plantswoman whose rear garden would give all year round interest. Fuchsias, hardy geranium, alchemilla mollis, tree peonies both pink and yellow flowering and a magnolia give vibrancy to this small garden. With the outside seating, this is definitely the room to be in when the sun shines.

#### Sarah May - 3rd

A garden with character would be an apt description. On entering, the view is of a neatly edged lawn with round stepping stones leading to a handmade garden room. Shaped wooden pieces had been used along with an arched window, reclaimed from an old building. An old gate was at right angles with fence to hide the wheel barrow. The shaped borders featured hardy plants including Erysimum 'bowles mauve' and Japanese anemones. Sarah informed us that this garden reflects her quirky character. We would agree.





#### **Mr. Humphries - Commendation**

We were greeted by a pretty front garden with roses and campanulas. The rear garden lawn is neatly edged with box and has water butts and compost bins neatly hidden away by the shed. The display of roses is repeated in this area along with containers adorning the fence and other pots, some of which were planted with colourful fuchsias. We always enjoy viewing this garden and his pride in it definitely shines out.



Free outdoor play activities, games, sports, arts and crafts, have fun, get messy, make friends

Last year was our first year at Stockfield Park – it was a great success and we are back again by popular demand! Come and join us in the park and have a great time. Don't wear your best clothes as you might get messy as we do lots of creative play Birmingham PlayCare Network (BPCN) for the last 15 years manages a scheme where teams of play workers deliver open access play provision in parks and recreation grounds. These schemes run in the school holidays throughout the year and the aim is for children and their families to reclaim the green spaces around their homes, love outdoor active play. The scheme is NOT childcare and parents retain full responsibility. Children that are coming along to play in parks are free to come and go as they please. # 'The Cottage Garden'

My grandparents lived in a terraced house in Basal Heath and looking back it would probably be described as a cottage garden. My grandfather grew lots of vegetables and the sweet peas and dianthus (pinks) he grew amongst these would feature on the living room table. The cottage garden was originally used by labourers to grow food for their family, herbs for medicinal purposes and a small amount of flowers to attract insects away From their vegetables.

It was gentrified later and ultimately the typical cottage garden became packed tight with an informal crowding

of a wide variety of plants, which is a signature feature — a mix of perennials including aquilegia, lupines, foxgloves, hardy geraniums and delphiniums coupled with annuals including nigella and stocks. Pastel shades give the look but also think about scent — use layender along with the herbs rosemary, sage and thyme. Mix these with vegetables. All these twining around each other and competing for attention provide an interesting and attractive garden.

Sow some beetroot seeds now. I saw lots of beetroot in Tewkesbury as an edge of a flower border, its red veined leaves providing an attractive surround.

Roses are a necessary feature for the summer but think about the winter and spring. You can sow primula seeds now ready for the spring, put in some bluebell, daffodil and tulip bulbs later in the year and to brighten up the early months, plant some hellebores which are available in white and a soft purple. Don't torget snowdrops!

Straight paths are not the thing - winding paths in natural stone or gravel will give access to each part of the garden. Put in a picket fence providing spaces for flowers to poke through.

In a small garden, where space is a problem, put in arches through which clematis and honeysuckle can scramble.

Remember, there are no set rules when creating the cottage garden. It is what you want it to be and what you want to see and eat from your outside space.

Each one is different just like people!

Claire\* looks after her grandson because her daughter has alcohol dependency issues. He's 17 now, has left school and can't find a job because he has an autistic spectrum disorder. He claims no benefits and lives off Alison's pension. She feeds them both and looks after her flat. Abisha\* speaks very little English. Her husband has left her to raise three young children with no help from him. She worries about the noise the children make in the flat and has neighbour issues. She often goes without food so the children can eat more. Brian\* lives on his own. He used to work until he had a breakdown. He finds it really embarrassing to ask for help. The Benefits Agency staff comes across to him as hostile and he really struggles to fill in the right forms and get to all the interviews.

Three people with one thing in common. They came into Acocks Green Foodbank and received a food package that will help to make sure they have enough to eat for three or four days. They didn't need a referral or a voucher because we have an open door policy. All three found more than a food package; they found someone to talk to. They found there's more help out there than you realise. You might hear about us and think "can I really make a difference?" You can make a difference; in a number of wavs.

- Donating cash or food items to your local Foodbank really does make a difference and we are so grateful for everything we receive.
- We'd love to discuss volunteering opportunities on a Tuesday or Friday morning if you have the time.

The Stockfield Community Association is a huge contributor to the local Foodbank and through the donations of people just like you we will work together, today, to ensure that one day, there is no hunger in Acocks Green.
