Stockfield Gardens

This garden has definitely developed when considering their first entry last year. Spring flowering shrubs have been added including Rhododendron and Camellia in addition to Pieris which has a striking red blossom. There are now many rose bushes which give a good backdrop to the healthy lawn and wooden fence. One of them has large deep red blooms. Forethought has been given to drought conditions with irrigation piping all along the beds.

Perhaps some plants and shrubs for Spring and Winter flowering interest could be added which would develop the garden even more.

This garden was full of colourful impact and well thought out to cope with the hot summers over the last few years. Our eyes were drawn to the many plants in the front garden which compliment each other and were planted to give year-round interest. The evergreen Geranium macrorrhizum which hardly needs watering, features near the front door and together with a beautiful red rose, there is cistus and a pieris as well as thyme and the yellow flowers of coreopsis. The tall Verbena bonariensis and the flower spires of mallow and sweet William compliment the white valerian. Then as we enter the front door with the geranium flanking it, we see an ivy hedge and the well-presented conical shaped hanging baskets. Going through the house, the patio doors appear to form a frame for the beautiful art, comprising of planting to be viewed from the sitting room.

An abundance of healthy plants are well presented. We immediately see a rhododendron and all types of hydrangeas both blue and pink and one really attractive lace cap variety. For form, there is Fatsia japonica with its spread out finger- like leaves. There is box for the evergreen aspect as well and magnolia for spring interest. We also peeked into the potting shed where Sheila explained that she grows many plants from seed. Alongside the shed is a water butt using the guttering and downpipes.

The beds are wavy shaped and soften the backdrop with their colourful planting. We viewed a water feature with a heron sculpture. We also see a bird feeder. Nearby there is a pot with a beautiful flowering dahlia.

A seating area provides a place to just look at this wonderful garden and the wildlife it attracts.

Walking towards the house, your eye is drawn to a hydrangea flanked by other shrubs in the front garden. Moving into the rear garden, we are always amazed how Susan manages to grow such beautiful, well-nourished plants in pots. The large blooms of the rose Princess Alexandra hit you immediately and then all around the fencing, there is an array of colourful plants mainly roses, the colours contrasting with the fence. There are healthy begonias spilling over from the hanging baskets there.

Other plants growing happily in pots comprise of variegated hebe, a yellow daisy and a photinia. She informs me that she adds chicken manure fertiliser to the pot soil and it obviously performs its magic on these plants. On the rear wall of the house there is a well thought out beautiful arrangement of plants and shrubs comprising of the expressive Fatsia japonica, hydrangeas and hostas.

Amongst the floral displays Susan showed me her memorial to her dead cats, well-constructed with cute images of cats. This shows that Susan is a caring person but not just of her planting. It is a beautiful garden nurtured with love and lots of hard work.

It is so good to see the passion Velida has for growing vegetables. Her dedication to nurturing a real mixed bag is quite exciting!

An archway is evident as you enter the garden with a pathway going through it leading you further into this garden bursting with huge green leaves on both sides with these vegetables, some with flowers showing, on the courgettes for instance, soon to be followed with the fruit.

The soft fruits grow in abundance including plump strawberries, a plum tree, grapes both black and white, a peach tree along with currents and blackberries. Velida grows tomatoes, melons and peppers including the unusual white pepper. Pumpkins are used to make pumpkin cake!

There is always an abundance of onions, both red and white. She grows most from seed including carrots.

It is all laid out very well, interspersed with flowers – good for attracting the aphids away.

I asked her the secret of her success and she pointed towards her large compost bin from which she produces the black gold to apply to her beds.

This garden must be time consuming for such perfection but at least Velida must save time by not having to shop for her food!

Walking up to the house, the front garden is an illustration of what is to feature in this garden.

In the centre is a stone water feature with hedging greening up the outer wall and plants including hebe. There is a beautiful hanging basket by the front door and many of the vivid pink Lychnis coronaria add colour and interest to the front.

Walking around the side of the house, this is very attractive with many pots including one where rhubarb is growing! Variegated holly brings life to the wooden fence as you walk to the rear garden where immediately there is a seating area with a mirror mounted on the fence to reflect the picture perfect garden. We see another seating area on the rear patio with wine glasses and a central floral display on the table. How inviting!



As you look across the lawn, it has a winding path formed with flag stones leading to the rear of this well manicured garden. There is a pond which Jeannette constructed herself flanked by the expressive Fatsia japonica and the blue hardy geranium. Nearby is a yet another seating area with comfortable sofas. Roses feature around the garden along with a large pink mallow with pots of strawberries and an apple tree.
